Tether Yourself: Advice for Youth (and adults too!) on Devices

Being a kid is tough no matter the era, and it is no surprise that our kids today are facing challenging experiences these days. Smartphones, IPads, tablets, etc. are everywhere and along with them is a constant bombardment of marketing tactics and psychological tricks. Between Instagram sending messages to wear the right clothes and look a specific way, social media algorithms that have our brains craving more comments, followers and likes, and the constant comparison of other people's lives, it's tough to be a young person right now.

It's also tough to be a parent these days!

This type of technology and social media is relatively new for all of us, and there's a pretty intimidating learning curve for parents everywhere. Because the previous generation did not have the internet exposure we have now, parents today have nowhere to turn to for help. We are relying on each other for tips on how to protect their children from issues with mental health, self-image, relationships, on-line predators and more that stem from the age of technology.

Rachel Macy Stafford is a best-selling author, public speaker, and parent. As part of her commitment to conscious parenting, she decided to tell the world about a unique turning point she had with her 14-year-old daughter. She (like many of us) felt an uneasiness about her child and her screen time consumption, particularly after finding a number of articles on youth suicide related to online bullying and social media use.

Rachel started a conversation with her daughter that she realized several weeks later would actually help her be noticeably more relaxed, more interested in family time, more physically active, and more diligent with homework and chores almost instantly.


Rachel explained to her daughter her own fears as a parent; with bullying, online pressures, etc. She told her what science actually says about kids and technology (that children's brains aren't fully developed, and so are especially susceptible to isolation, hopelessness, and more). And then she gave her a special letter. Here are just a few powerful snippets that encompass this mother's love for her child:

"Each time the phone notifies you, you stop what you are doing—whether it's homework or a job you have to do. What might take you one hour to do, will take you several, and it won't be completed as well. The inability to focus will reflect in your grades and impact the job

opportunities you have as you grow. Spending quality time with friends and family will be impacted by the need to check the phone, making you believe what is most important is on your phone when it is really the person in front of you.

"Awareness is your weapon against the hidden influences and damaging behaviors. While you are online, your mind, your thoughts, your core values are drifting to wherever tech companies want you to go. The remedy is to limit the time you spend drifting in the online world and tether yourself to real life."

"Tether yourself: To real people, real conversations, and real scenery.

Tether yourself: To furry animals, interesting books, good music, the great outdoors. **Tether yourself:** To spatulas, hammers, cameras, paintbrushes, and yoga mats."

"When you feel your worth is in question, when you feel lost and alone, when you feel sad and you can't explain why, TETHER YOURSELF TO REAL LIFE AND REAL PEOPLE."

ESTABLISH GROUND RULES FOR SCREEN TIME Rachel followed up with a few ground rules (which she recommends for parents too!), I have added a few of my own:

- · Don't charge your phone in your room overnight
- Let your friends know you won't respond to texts after 9pm
- · Use a real alarm clock instead of your phone
- · Hourly limits to cell phone time at home
- Dare your friends to have a sleepover with no screen time
- Set a timer for when they are on a device
- · For younger kids, put all the devices away: out of sight, out of mind
- Use screen time as a reward: 30 minutes extra for completed chores and homework (without arguing!)
- Chose a day (or evening) a week with NO SCREEN time for the household
- Utilize parental controls on your Wi-Fi, modem, and devices
- Be a good role model, put down your devices and tether yourself








Virtual Field Trip with Glacier National Park



Scholarships to Consider(Chronological)

This is not an exhaustive list—these are just ones that are floating across my desk currently.

- 1. RE/MAX of Western Canada "Quest For Excellence" Bursary Program—Closes March 9. This program was established by RE/MAX of Western Canada to recognize the success and ongoing pursuits of Western Canadian students in regards to leadership and community contribution initiatives. Students can enter online at www.remax.ca.
- 2. Alberta NewsPrint Corporation—Closes May 8 at noon. Application includes a letter of application, two letters of recommendation, and a short essay on a topic. **Paper printouts** of the scholarship are available from Mrs. Hodges.
- 3. MD of Greenview No. 16—Closes second Friday of May. Application includes a completed form, an official or unofficial transcript, and MAY include reference letters. **Paper printouts** of the scholarship application are available from Mrs. Hodges.
- 4. TC Energy Scholarship—Closes May 15 at midnight. Basic scholarship criteria:
 - a) Enrolled in a post-secondary institution for the Fall-start school year
 - b) A citizen or permanent resident of Canada
 - c) Located in a community near TC Energy's operations or projects
 - d) Would benefit from supplementary education funding
- 5. Premiers Citizenship—Applications in to the school office by May 15. Application includes a completed form, two letters of reference, and a record of accomplishments chart outlining the community service, volunteer work, citizenship, and leadership activities of the student. The Premier Citizenship award nominee may also be considered for the other two Alberta Citizenship Awards. **Paper printouts** of the application are available from Mrs. Hodges.
- 6. Chevron Canada Scholarship—Applications in to the school office by June 11. 4 disciplines:
 - a) Mental health
 - b) Emergency services
 - c) Nursing and Medical services
 - d) Recreation

If Chevron does not receive an application for the areas of studies listed above the selection committee will review application for any post-secondary degree or diploma.

The student must have applied to a post-secondary or trades college in one of the disciplines to apply within six months of graduating, award given upon proof of registration. Students are required to provide a 500 word application essay on why they have chosen to pursue an education in their field of choice and a reference letter from a teacher or community volunteer activity coordinator.

7. Alberta Teachers Association Scholarship—Application date TBA (usually around end of May). For students who are pursuing a degree in Education. **Paper copies** of the scholarship are available from Mrs. Hodges.





Repsol –Last year's date was June 17. Applications for this scholarship are in the form of an essay outlining their academic plans for the future, explaining why they need the money, and telling a little about themselves. - 9. Steven Harding Memorial Scholarship. Application in to the school office by June 15. A letter of application is required describing why the applicant should receive the award based upon ALL of the stated criteria:
 - a) Participation in extra-curricular activities
 - b) Community involvement
 - c) A History of volunteerism
 - d) A positive attitude
 - e) Displayed enthusiasm to work, school and their peers
- 10. Town of Fox Creek Legacy Scholarship—Application to Town Office by August 15. This award will go to the graduating High School Student who exemplifies the qualities of good citizenship at Fox Creek School and in the Community. The winner of this award should have demonstrated the following attributes:
 - a) Leadership: The student should be very involved in school and community activities. A
 - b) Positive Attitude: The student will have displayed a positive attitude towards academics, extracurricular activities, fellow students and the community.
 - c) Academics: the student should be achieving academically at a level commensurate with their abilities and be enrolled in a post-secondary program at a provincially approved institution.

The student must present a letter detailing your attributes in relation to the outlined criteria.



Shell has indicated that they are offering Scholarships this year. In the past, the academic counsellor has applied via an online portal on behalf of all the students who meet the criteria. Last year's criteria was STEM based. When that is announced, Mrs. Hodges will contact all students that she is aware of that are pursuing post secondary in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math.

Rutherford Scholarship applications open in August and students must apply directly to that. Here is a link https://studentaid.alberta.ca/scholarships/alberta-scholarships/alexander-rutherfordscholarship/how-to-apply/ which includes a link to the actual application page. Students may receive financial help up to \$2500 depending on their presenting averages in each of their grade 10-12 years if they are enrolled in a recognized post secondary.
