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### What is the In-school *Mentoring Program?*

- ◆ A program offered by Big Brothers Big Sisters and your child/youth's school
- ♦ It involves either an adult or teen volunteer being matched with a grade 1-6 student
- ◆ An opportunity for children to benefit from a one-to-one relationship with a caring, reliable adult/teen
- ♦ A way to expand the child's information about the world beyond their own family and neighbourhood

#### How does it work?

- ♦ Each volunteer, who is accepted as a mentor, will be matched with a child
- ♦ Mentors visit with their mentee at the child's school
- ♦ Visits are during school hours for one hour per week over the course of the school year
- ◆ The *Mentee* and the *Mentor* spend their time in ways that are of interest to the child (ex: physical activity, playing board games, visiting the school library, talking, drawing, making things, etc.)

#### Who are the Mentors?

- Our mentors are adults (over 18 years old) OR teens (Grades 7-12); this will depend on the program being offered at the school
- ♦ People who like children, relate well to them, and want to be helpful
- Reliable adults/teens who provide their mentee with consistency
- ♦ People who have been screened, trained, and supervised by the Big Brothers Big Sisters agency
- People who commit themselves to this volunteer work for one school year and may be available to continue with the same child for a subsequent year

# What is the role of a parent?

- Support the child's friendship with the *Mentor* by letting the child know the parent is glad he/she is involved
- Know that the parent is welcome to meet the *Mentor* at the school, at a planned *Meet the Mentor Meeting*
- Notice how the child reacts to the *Mentor's* visits (whether they look forward to them)
- ♦ Report any concerns to the school or Big Brothers Big Sisters immediately
- ♦ Allow the child to take things to school to show the *Mentor* or to play with during their visits
- Sign a release of information form before the program begins
- ◆ Inform the agency if your child wishes to attend a monthly Big Bunch Event information sent out by email
- Give information about the child's interests and needs so a suitable match with a *Mentor* can be made
- ♦ Call the school or inform the agency, when the child is absent on the day that the visit is scheduled
- Ask questions about the program before agreeing to participate
- Give an opinion on the program if asked by the *Coordinator*
- ♦ Be aware that there are a limited number of *Mentors* available, and matches may not be possible for all children.
- Be willing to volunteer for an agency event at least once per year, if the opportunity arises.

# What is the role of the school in the Mentoring Program?

- ♦ Carefully consider which children would benefit most from the program
- ◆ Contact parents about the opportunity for *Mentoring*
- ♦ Contact children whose parents agree to the *Mentoring Program*
- ♦ Observe children's reactions to visits
- ♦ Report any concerns to the Big Brothers Big Sisters agency
- ♦ Make locations for visits available in the school

# What might be the benefits of this extra adult attention for children?

- ♦ Children may feel more important
- ♦ Children may become more self-confident in their ability to succeed
- Children may become more comfortable in making friends
- ◆ Children may become interested in the kind of work the *Mentors* do and see the importance of staying in school
- ♦ School work may improve because of this positive experience during the school year

### What DON'T Mentors do?

- ♦ Counselling
- ◆ Tutoring
- ♦ Contact children outside school hours
- Give children expensive gifts
- ♦ Punish (for example: visits will NOT be cancelled if children have misbehaved at school)
